South Florida Jewish organizations are delivering Passover meals to families in need, Holocaust survivors and other homebound seniors throughout the next few weeks leading up to the holiday, which begins on the evening of April 15.

The **Dorit & Ben J. Genet Cupboard of Goodman Jewish Family Services of Broward County** will provide 600 families traditional Passover packages that include *matzah*, gefilte fish, macaroons, grape juice and matzo ball soup mix. Additionally, more than 600 Holocaust survivors will also receive a seder plate and a prepared dinner consisting of roasted chicken with *tzimmes* and potato kugel. Goodman JFS Holocaust Survivor Assistance Program's care managers will deliver Passover items to survivors between April 11–14.



Randy Colman, president and CEO of Goodman JFS, said, "It means the world to us to see the look of gratitude and appreciation on the faces of families and Holocaust survivors we serve."

"Their struggle is hard enough," Colman continued. "if we can lessen their burdens with a holiday package or prepared meal, then we're fulfilling our mission."

Tamara Shulman, a member of Goodman JFS' Holocaust Survivor Assistance Program who lived in Dnipro, Ukraine and currently lives in Hallandale Beach, said, "I am so grateful for this Passover delivery from Goodman Jewish Family Services."

"Being part of the Holocaust Assistance Survivors Program makes me feel that I'm not alone and that I'm taken care of, especially during the holidays," Shulman, 88, continued. "I am proud to be part of our Jewish community here in Broward."

Shulman expressed her concern with the Russian invasion of her native country.

"I was born in Ukraine and lived almost all my life there," she said. "I can't imagine what Ukrainian people are going through right now. My brother and his family are still in Ukraine, and I pray every day for them to be safe from harm."



The Cupboard clients will receive items from April 1–14 by delivery or by scheduling a pickup during operating hours, which are Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Volunteers will help deliver Passover packages during *Mitzvah* Sundays, April 3 and 10 from 9 a.m.-noon. Ferd & Gladys Alpert Jewish Family Service in West Palm Beach is conducting two kinds of meal deliveries for the holiday. On April 6, the agency is delivering Passover baskets to 75 households that are filled with non-perishable Passover foods, like matzo, soup, canned vegetables, macaroons, kosher turkey or Publix gift card, and other holiday treats. The meals are meant to provide food for people who may have recently lost a job or need additional help making ends meet.

On April 14, Alpert JFS is partnering with the Kind Kitchen and the Jewish Federation of Palm Beach County to deliver meals to more than 100 Holocaust survivors. The meals will be filled with all the foods needed for the Seder.

Belinda Lasky, director of volunteer leadership for Alpert JFS, said, "Alpert JFS is grateful to all of the volunteers who help prepare the holiday baskets, as well as deliver the meals to families so they can celebrate the holiday."



"It is always meaningful when volunteers come together to help the community, especially during a poignant holiday like Passover," Lasky continued.
